

Ask Me Anything ALS - Feeding Tubes/Nutrition

As ALS progresses, eating and drinking can become difficult, which can often lead to discussions about feeding tubes. The decision to get a feeding tube is a personal one. There are advantages and disadvantages that must be taken into account when considering a feeding tube. It can be helpful to hear from those who have been through this process. Like with all decisions, it's incredibly important to consider your personal values when navigating the healthcare system.

- Feeding Tube Supplies (disclaimer: I AM ALS has no affiliation with the product manufacturers below – these are non-exhaustive lists meant to offer examples of products available.) Your ALS care team can help arrange for you to receive all of the necessary supplies to use and care for your feeding tube.
 - G-Tube Holders Various Medical Supply Companies, Amazon, Etsy
 - Description: A G-tube holder/belt can help with securing PEG tubes in place and can be purchased on <u>Amazon</u>, <u>Walmart</u> and other locations.



- Site Pads Various Medical Supply Companies, Amazon, Etsy
 - <u>Description</u>: Use G-tube, GJ Tube, Mic-key button pads with snap closures to soak up any leakage from the feeding tube site. Pads can be reusable or disposable, as well as simple or decorative.
 - Washable plain button pads can be purchased on <u>Amazon</u>,
 <u>Etsy</u> and other locations.
 - <u>Drainage Split Gauze Sponge</u> is a disposable tube site dressing to help prevent pooling fluids.
 - A <u>waterproof dressing</u> can be used when swimming to cover the feeding tube site on the abdomen.
- PIll Crushers Various Online Stores, Pharmacies
 - <u>Description:</u> Pill Crushers can crush or grind tablets into powder, which can then be administered through a person's feeding tube. **Note:** not all tablets can be crushed, so be sure to ask your care provider about how to effectively take your medications.
 - Pill crushers like the <u>Pill Grinder</u>, <u>Silent Knight pill crusher</u>, the <u>CVS Health Pill Crusher Plus Storage</u>, or the <u>Equate</u> <u>Easy Grip Pill Crusher</u> may be helpful.
